

Ghassan Kanafani

Early Life

- Born in 1936 in Acre
- Son of lawyer; third of eight children
- During 1948 Arab-Israeli War, his family fled to Lebanon
- Settled in Damascus, Syria
- Received UNRWA teaching certificate in 1952
- Enrolled in Department of Arab Literature at University of Damascus
- Met George Habash in 1953
- Lived in Kuwait then moved to Beirut
- Married Anni Høver in 1961
- Assassinated by Mossad in 1972

The Land of Sad Oranges

- Published in 1958
- Oranges represent Palestine, family, land, and martyrs.
- Depression of being a refugee
- A child gaining consciousness of his situation
- Intimate relationship between a person and their oranges.
- If a Palestinian is separated from their land, they are lost.



"The groves of orange trees followed each other in succession along the side of the road." "And all the orange trees that your father had abandoned to the Jews shone in his eyes, all the well-tended orange trees that he had bought one by one were printed in his face and reflected in the tears that he could not control..."
